

THE STORY OF THE IA

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Abstract:

The Ia is a traditional Romanian blouse and one of the most representative elements of the Romanian folk costume. Usually made of white cotton, linen, or borangic — a fine natural silk fabric — the Ia is distinguished by its delicate cut, symbolic ornamentation, and rich embroidery. Its decorative motifs are traditionally placed on the sleeves, chest, and neckline, and they often include geometric, floral, or nature-inspired patterns. These motifs are not merely aesthetic; they reflect regional identity, social status, craftsmanship, and cultural symbolism passed down through generations.

In some regions, the Ia is also embellished with beads, sequins, or colored threads, which enhance its visual richness and uniqueness. Each blouse may differ depending on the area where it was created, making the Ia an important marker of Romania's ethnographic diversity. Beyond its role as a garment, the Ia represents heritage, femininity, creativity, and the continuity of Romanian traditions.

Today, the Ia is worn both during traditional celebrations and as a symbol of national identity in Romania and in Romanian communities around the world. Its cultural importance is celebrated annually on June 24, during the feast of Sânzienă or Drăgaica, which is also known as the Universal Day of the Romanian Ia. This celebration highlights the value of the Ia as a living symbol of Romanian culture, connecting the past with the present and preserving traditional craftsmanship for future generations.

The History, Symbolism and Contemporary Relevance of the Romanian Ia

The story of the Romanian *Ia* is much older than it may seem at first glance. From an etymological point of view, the Romanian word *ie*, used to describe the traditional blouse, is believed to be connected to the Latin expression *tunicae lineae*, meaning a thin linen tunic worn directly on the skin. This connection highlights the continuity between

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ancient clothing forms and the traditional Romanian shirt, which developed over time into one of the most important symbols of national identity.

Materials, Colors and Embroidered Symbols

Today, most Romanian *ii* are made of cotton, but in the past women usually used natural fabrics such as linen, hemp, or *borangic*. These materials were produced in the household and reflected the skills, patience, and creativity of Romanian women. The making of an *Ia* was not only a practical activity, but also an artistic and spiritual process.

The embroidery of the *Ia* was traditionally rich, complex, and carefully placed on the sleeves, chest, and neckline. The colors were often bright and expressive, and in some regions the blouse was decorated with beads, sequins, or shiny threads. However, these ornaments were not chosen only for their beauty. In the past, every motif had a meaning. The symbols embroidered on the *Ia* were believed to protect the person who wore it from evil spirits, bad luck, illness, or harmful charms.

Geometric shapes, flowers, crosses, spirals, stars, and other traditional motifs carried symbolic meanings connected to protection, fertility, nature, life, and spirituality. While today many people may see these patterns mainly as decorative or abstract, in traditional communities they formed a visual language passed down from one generation to another. Each region had its own embroidery style, colors, and compositions, which made the *Ia* a strong marker of local identity.

Personalities Who Promoted the Romanian Ia

Over time, many important Romanian personalities contributed to the promotion of the *Ia* and helped transform it into a national cultural symbol. One of the most important figures was Queen Maria of Romania. She loved the Romanian traditional costume and often wore it with elegance and pride. Numerous photographs show Queen Maria dressed in traditional Romanian garments, including the *Ia*, proving her admiration for Romanian folk art and identity.

Another major personality who promoted the Romanian *Ia* was Maria Tănase, one of the most famous Romanian singers. Through her music, public appearances, and strong connection with Romanian folklore, she helped make the *Ia* known both in Romania and abroad. Her image remains closely connected to Romanian tradition and folk culture.

Smaranda Brăescu, the first licensed female parachutist in Romania, European parachuting champion, and world champion, was also among the personalities who wore and promoted the Romanian *Ia*. Through such figures, the *Ia* became more than a traditional garment; it became a symbol of elegance, courage, femininity, and Romanian identity.

In contemporary society, the Romanian *Ia* continues to be appreciated and reinvented. Although times and customs have changed, this traditional blouse has not disappeared. On the contrary, it has been adapted to modern fashion and is now worn at cultural events, national celebrations, festivals, and even in everyday outfits.
